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






Each letter is assigned a number. Every square with that number corresponds to that letter. Start with the smallest words to begin guessing the remaining letter-number matches!

RENTING VS BUYING IN TODAY'S REAL ESTATE MARKET

The age old question - should you rent or buy? While each person's goals and finances certainly play a role, I pulled the average rents and sales prices from 2013 and 2023 to see what difference owning a home could have made in your life.

In those ten years, rental rates went up 27.8% on average, payments which did not add to the renters assets. Property values went up 73.7% in that same time adding massive equity to the owners assets, including your landlords. Many home owners of course used those increases in value to buy larger properties over time, invest in more property, and/or pay off debt.

Had you purchased a home in 2013 at the average price of \$210,000 today that house would be worth \$364,770. In most of our area that house could have been bought with zero or just \$7,350 in down payment. This is how average people are able to increase their wealth much faster in real estate than investing in other financial markets.

Today we have access to multiple zero down loan programs in both the city and county, and as sales have begun to slow with higher interest rates, buyers are sometimes able to negotiate closing cost assistance as well. It's worth it to find out what your options are for moving from renting to owning!

VOSTRIKOV'S NUTCRACKER ATTRACTS NATIONAL TALENT

Melissa Kauffmann recalls the first time she saw a professional ballet as a young girl, noting that she knew in that moment she wanted to dance. She followed that passion through college until she experienced a back injury that ended her performing days. It led her to teaching and Vostrikov's Academy of the Ballet. Gennadi and Susan Vostrikov, both professional ballet dancers who performed around the world, started Vostrikov's Academy of Ballet in 1982. The couple came to Winchester to be near Susan's family. Gennadi started out teaching at Shenandoah Conservatory (now Shenandoah University) before deciding he wanted to teach younger students because there was



more he could help improve with young dancers. When the Vostrikovs retired in 2017, Melissa took ownership of Vostrikov's Academy of Ballet and has been running it ever since.

Melissa describes Vostrikov's Academy of Ballet as a nurturing studio that gives great instruction, and is aware that every individual has different needs and talents. She aims to nurture each student as a whole child. "I'm always saying to my students that more than anything, I want you to be good humans. I want you to be contributing to our society. I want you to feel good about yourself so you can feel good to give to other people, be supportive of each other. I love seeing the older ones nurture the younger ones and the younger ones really looking up to the older ones and really aspiring to what


they can do."

The Academy's annual offering of the Nutcracker is extra special this year. Two international ballet stars will be guest performers. Kathryn Morgan, formerly of New York City Ballet and Miami City Ballet, will be the Sugar Plum Fairy in the Sunday, December 17 performance. Kathryn famously performed as a principal in the New York City Ballet as a teenager, taking on roles such as Juliet in Romeo and Juliet. She is known throughout the industry, not just for her skill and early success, but also for her tutorials online, her product line, and her incredible comeback to the stage after battling an autoimmune disease.

The Cavalier, who dances with the Sugar Plum Fairy, will be portrayed by Sean Rollofson of Ballet Met. Sean, who is described by Melissa as a genuine and incredibly thoughtful human, agreed to take on the Cavalier role when the Academy's regular performer had a conflict with his own university senior recital happening that same weekend. When Melissa put out the call looking for a replacement, she never expected such an acclaimed performer to agree to travel to Winchester. As luck would have it, the Vostrikov's daughter (who is a freelance dancer in New York City) saw Melissa's post about needing a male ballet dancer and put the notice out to her ballet community. Sean reached out saying he loved having the opportunity to bring higher levels of ballet to communities that don't regularly have the opportunity to view such performances. Upon hearing that the Vostrikov's Academy of Ballet performers loved watching Kathryn Morgan online, Sean reached out to Kathryn directly and asked her to join him in Winchester for a performance.

EMPOWERING GIRLS THROUGH RUNNING



Girls on the Run (GOTR) may have running in its name, but it's about much more than just physical activity. This unique program is designed to empower girls in grades 3-8 by coaching them through a curriculum that encompasses a wide range of life skills. From healthy decision-making to conflict resolution, fostering friendships, and giving back to the community, GOTR strives to build confident and well-rounded young individuals.

The Shenandoah Valley chapter of Girls on the Run was established in 2011 and is currently under the capable leadership of Executive Director Annoica Ingram. Annoica's personal journey with GOTR is inspiring; she served as a dedicated coach for almost a decade before taking on her current role. She takes immense pride in witnessing the transformation of girls who participate in the program, watching them grow in self-confidence and compassion towards their peers.

One of the most heartwarming aspects of GOTR is the community service projects the girls undertake. At each location, participants are tasked with selecting a local cause or group to support, devising a plan to make a positive impact, and then putting that plan into action. Projects have ranged from collecting donations for local animal shelters to creating heartfelt thank-you cards for teachers, reinforcing the importance of giving back to their communities.

GOTR tailors its offerings to different age groups, with girls in grades 3-5 participating in Girls on the Run and those in grades 6-8 joining Heart and Sole. The curriculum is refreshed periodically to keep returning participants engaged, and it can be adjusted to accommodate girls with disabilities or special needs. The programs typically run twice a week for 90 minutes over ten weeks and are held at community sites such as local schools or parks. Volunteer coaches, who undergo training by GOTR and are provided with necessary supplies, lead these sessions. Financial assistance is available through scholarships, and over \$10,000 in scholarships were awarded in the last season. Additionally, girls in need can receive free sneakers to support their participation.

To witness the impact of the program firsthand, I attended the annual 5k event held in November at Admiral Richard E. Byrd Middle School. The event was a heartwarming showcase of support for these young girls. Volunteers cheered the girls and their running buddies along the course, offering words of encouragement and praise. Parents, siblings, friends, and community members held signs, rang bells, and cheered every girl as she crossed the finish line. In a world often focused on winning, this event delivered a powerful message: every participant's journey is valued, regardless of their race time.

One parent shared, "I was a little hesitant when my daughter asked to join Girls on the Run. Running is not her strong suit. After her first practice, she considered quitting, but she spoke to her coach and came home saying, 'As long as I finish, mom, I am a winner.' Our biggest takeaway from GOTR this year was to push through to the end! My daughter has built her self-esteem and confidence during this year's GOTR fall session and is looking forward to participating again in the spring."

A dedicated coach also expressed her enthusiasm for the program, saying, "It is your chance to help girls at an age that is complicated for them. It gives you the chance to form relationships and get girls to open up about challenges they might have. It puts a fun twist on running that even girls who are not avid runners can enjoy. The curriculum is easy to follow, making it easy to coach and enjoy the time with the girls."

Girls on the Run of the Shenandoah Valley is making a profound impact on the lives of young girls, teaching them invaluable life skills while fostering a sense of community and self-worth.
